Ensuring Seniors A Pathway for All Who Need It

It has always been the mission of our Village to reflect the population in the areas we serve. We want more people in our community to benefit from the Village model and its impact on individual health, morale and social functioning. CVV also wants to benefit from the knowledge, experience and rich perspectives of diverse populations. And just as important, we want to be sustainable in the future which will require addressing changing demographics.

With that in mind, last year the CVV Board of Directors embarked on the question of whether or not our Village was doing all it could to create opportunities for the underserved, low-income, and/or other marginalized senior populations within our community. We found that many times these are the voices of people in our community that are missing from meaningful conversations.

Because it was about "walking the talk", CVV enthusiastically began the process of a comprehensive training program through SAGECare, one of the country's largest and oldest organizations dedicated to teaching how to improve the lives of the under -served. The training program equipped our leadership and volunteers with the knowledge to provide



exceptional services to marginalized populations. And, we are happy to report that in November 2023, we successfully completed all of the requirements in the credentialing program. We obtained official SAGECare credentials for the years 2023 and 2024 that show that our Village team has done the work and is equipped to create a more positive environment for marginalized individuals including a once invisible group - those within the LGBTQ+ community of older adults.

Our approach to diversity is simple: it's about embracing everyone. From cultivating a culture where all volunteers and members can bring their best selves, to deploying diversity initiatives that support all, we are doing what it takes to build a more equitable community. Conejo Valley Village connects all of us with one another regardless of race, gender identity, sexual orien-

tation, age, hearing, and visual or physical impairments. Together we are changing how we age in a supportive and engaging community. We offer support and opportunities for meaningful engagement that enable us to age in place with a sense of belonging and dignity.

We must remember, though, that values written on a page are just the start. They must be woven into our programs and policies and be demonstrated by our actions. We encourage you to join with us, with your own unique perspectives, on the journey to put these values into practice and make space for continued positive outcomes!

Introducing THE EVENTS WAITLIST!

Great news! CVV is growing at a rapid pace, and we're thrilled to welcome new members and volunteers monthly. Occasionally we offer events that must limit the number of people who can attend or set a deadline date for registration. Examples are venues needing a number in advance for ordering food and setting up tables, fire department capacity rules, and events at members' homes or small rooms.

So, to accommodate as many of us as possible, we have set up a new WAITLIST process. If one of these events is already closed, as noted on the registration page, just call the host listed there (or a Call Manager) and ask to be placed on the WAITLIST. If someone cancels, people on the WAITLIST will be offered the spot.

As you can see, it's very important to remember to CANCEL your registration if you can't go, so someone else can go in your place. Just CANCEL online or contact a Call Manager. We understand last-minute things arise when you can't let us know. But, otherwise, please follow this process so we don't have empty seats that could have been enjoyed by WAITLISTERS.
